Household Hazardous Waste

What is household hazardous waste (HHW)?

HHW is unwanted hazardous waste generated by residents at their home. It is generally any product with DANGER, WARNING or CAUTION printed on the label. Safe disposal of HHW is important to protecting the health and safety of our homes, children, pets, communities, wildlife and environment.

HHW includes

- Paint (latex, oil, spray)
- Automotive fluids (motor oil, antifreeze, etc.)
- Cleaners
- Lawn and garden products
- Fluorescent light bulbs
- Batteries

- Nail polish
- Fluorescent lightbulbs
- Cooking oil
- Pesticides/insecticides
- Pool chemicals
- Mercury (any items containing mercury)



What to do with HHW

Safe disposal of HHW is critical to protecting the health and safety of our children, pets, communities, wildlife and environment.



HHW Disposal for Missouri Residents

The Regional HHW Collection Program provides access to proper HHW disposal for residents living in Cass, Clay, Jackson, Platte and Ray counties in Missouri.

HHW Disposal for Kansas Residents

Kansas residents who live in Leavenworth, Wyandotte, Johnson, or Miami counties can take their HHW for free to their respective facility.
